WOMEN'S BANK volunteers in Finland and abroad are organised into more than 40 local groups that raise funds and host a wide range of activities to raise awareness of Women's Bank and our work.

National teams in Finland provide volunteers with invaluable support in communications, local activities and cooperation with businesses.

Next Generation is a group for young adults that seeks to expand operations and gain popularity among young adults.

Volunteers traditionally organise three national campaigns each year. For those who enjoy more physical activities, Women's Bank Walk and Women's Bank Golf campaigns offer a great way to promote global equality in the summer and autumn.

Our Women's Bank Read campaign always features a famous author who co-hosts literary events with us around Finland. Funds are raised through events and book sales. In addition, around twenty book clubs in different parts of Finland meet throughout the year.

Women's Bank also offers interesting volunteering opportunities for specialists who share our passion for equality and sustainable development. The development team consisting of volunteers and Finn Church Aid's programme professionals supports Women's Bank's project work around the world.

Results of our work in 2022

In 2022, we directly reached 29,000 women in five countries in Africa and Asia. Our support to women included vocational training and support for starting a business, thereby supporting women to create a livelihood for themselves. Women's Bank's projects are marked with pink dots on the map.

UGANDA IS Africa's largest refugee-hosting country with more than a million refugees, most of them women and children.

We support women's entrepreneurship in refugee settlements, in the slums of the capital Kampala and in the nearby town of Mityana, where we run a chicken farm as a social enterprise.

Savings and loan groups, as well as vocational skills training, have proven to be an effective way to provide women with income opportunities. In just one year, the groups managed to double their savings to more than 710,000 euros!

What are savings and loan groups and cooperatives?

- They are groups for women that encourage women to save and build financial.
- entrepreneurial and leader-
- All women save money into a joint fund and take out loans when their turn comes.
- Last year, women were able to raise a staggering 3 million euros in capital!
- There are 577 savings and loan groups, and cooperatives have nearly 27,000 members.

IN KENYA'S capital Nairobi we launched a circular economy project to provide employment and business opportunities for women living in the slums. We train women to sort, process and utilise waste

Women have managed to turn the city's huge waste streams into a livelihood by selling plastics for recycling or by finding employment in the sector's companies. Last year, women also set up a joint

Nepal: **8,302**

women improved their livelihoods

COOPERATIVES were an effective way of improving women's livelihoods and position in Nepal. With our support, the funds available to women every day increased by 30% in Lalitpur compared to 2021, while in the Sindhul region, women's income rose by 10%.

Women were also empowered to take an active role in issues that matter to them. The results show that long-term work creates sustainable structures.

THE WOMEN'S savings and loan groups and joint ventures we support have helped women improve their income opportunities regardless of the country's unstable conditions since the military coup.

Women have also taken a more active role in local decision-making bodies, reflecting their growing empowerment. 1,578

members in 90 saving and loan groups.

Cambodia: **8,127**

women improved their livelihoods

CAMBODIA IS one of the countries most severely affected by climate change globally. In poor rural regions where people rely on agriculture for their livelihoods one flood or drought can destroy everything.

We support women's access to livelihoods, particularly through saving and loan groups and cooperatives. We train women in the use of climate-resistant farming techniques and crop varieties. We also offer vocational education and training to young people.

Five reasons to support women's work

Work is a human right, not accessible to all

Every woman should have financial independence and the power to make their own choices. Yet, for many women, access to employment remains a distant dream, unachievable due to poverty and inequality.

- 2.4 billion women lack the same economic opportunities as men.
- In 18 countries, husbands can legally prevent their wives from working.

Invisible work deprives women of opportunities

Women carry out three times more unpaid household work than men on average. Especially in developing countries, the time girls and women spend on household work is time away from gainful employment, studying and participation in society.

- Globally, women spend up to five hours a day on household and care work.
- This means women perform a huge amount of work, but only get paid for a fraction of it.

Without work, women are disadvantaged

If women depend on others for income and security, they are unable to make their own

choices. Women and girls typically drop out of education when they get married or have children.

Two-thirds of the global illiterate population are women.
One in three women in the world has experienced intimate partner violence.

Work and income give women the freedom to make their own decisions

Having an occupation and an income opportunity allow women to choose their own paths.

Having financial independence and skills encourage women to participate in society in other ways, too.

- An educated mother is more likely to invest in the education of her children, to take care of their wellbeing, and to have fewer children.
- Gainfully employed mothers are major role models for girls.

Moving forward without half of the world's population is impossible

Supporting women's work and entrepreneurship is one of the most effective ways to


increase equality in families and societies. It empowers women and unlocks their enormous potential. The world needs skilled women!

At the current rate, it will take 300 years to achieve gender equality.



WOMEN'S BANK operates entirely with donated funds. In 2022, Finns donated EUR 1.5 million to our work, allowing us to provide training and support for entrepreneurship to 29,000 women in five countries.

In 2022, the costs of Women's Bank programme work exceeded income by 400,000 euros, which was covered from the Women's Bank fund that contains surpluses from previous years.
